Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord.


Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give our thanks and praise.

joining our voices with the celestial choirs and with all the faithful of every time and place, who forever sing to the glory of your name:



You are holy, O God of majesty, and blessed is Jesus Christ, your Son, our Lord, who gave us this holy feast, that we who eat this bread and drink this cup may here proclaim his holy sacrifice and be partakers of his resurrection, and at the last day may reign with him in heaven.

We give you thanks that the Lord Jesus, on the night before he died, took bread, and after giving thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take, eat. This is my body, given for you. Do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way he took the cup, saying: This cup is the new covenant sealed in my blood, shed for you for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this in remembrance of me.

Remembering all your mighty and merciful acts, we take this bread and this wine from the gifts you have given us, and celebrate with joy the redemption won for us in Jesus Christ. Accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving as a living and holy offering of ourselves, that our lives may proclaim the One crucified and risen.

Great is the mystery of faith:



Gracious God, pour out your Holy Spirit upon us and upon these your gifts of bread and wine, that the bread we break and the cup we bless may be the communion of the body and blood of Christ.

By your Spirit unite us with the living Christ and with all who are baptized in his name, that we may be one in ministry in every place. As this bread is Christ's body for us, send us out to be the body of Christ in the world. Lead us, O God, by the power of your Spirit to live as love commands. Bound to Christ, set us free for joyful obedience and glad service. As Jesus gave his life for ours, help us to live our lives for others with humility and persistent courage. Give us strength to serve you faithfully until the promised day of resurrection, when, with the redeemed of all the ages, we will feast with you at your table in glory.

Through Christ, all glory and honour are yours, almighty Father, with the Holy Spirit in the holy church, now and forever. **Amen.**



## The Breaking of the Bread


The priest breaks the bread, saying

We break this bread to share in the body of Christ.

We who are many are one body,

#### for we all share in the one bread.

While the bread is broken Agnus Dei is sung.



### **Invitation to Communion**

Behold the Lamb of God,

behold him who takes away the sins of the world.

Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb.

#### Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word, and I shall be healed.

All receive Holy Communion. Communion will be administered in one kind only. Communicants are asked to approach in single file, maintaining physical distance, returning to their places via the side aisles.

Those who are not to receive the Blessed Sacrament are invited to unite themselves with Jesus by making a Spiritual Communion.

#### Act of Spiritual Communion

My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the most Blessed Sacrament. I love you above all things and I desire to receive you into my soul. Since I cannot now receive you sacramentally, come spiritually into my heart. I embrace you as if you were already there, and unite myself wholly to you. Never permit me to be separated from you. Amen.

Healing ministry will be offered in the Holy Innocents chapel. Please enter the chapel one at a time. You may wish to record prayer points or remembrances on a piece of paper prior to Mass.

After Communion, the ablutions are taken then the celebrant or another minister places a Host, consecrated at the Mass, in the monstrance upon the altar.

#### **Procession of the Blessed Sacrament**

All kneel for a time, and the Eucharist is incensed, then the procession begins.


2 Alleluia! not as orphans Are we left in sorrow now; Alleluia! he is near us, Faith believes, nor questions how.

After the procession, the Eucharist is again placed on the altar, and the hymn Tantum ergo Sacramentum is sung, all kneeling.

#### Collect

#### **Eucharistic Blessing**

The minister puts on the humeral veil, genuflects, and takes the monstrance. The minister makes the sign of the cross over the people with the monstrance in silence.

Then the Divine Praises are recited, the minister saying each petition, which is repeated by the people.

Blessed be God.

Blessed be his Holy Name. Blessed be Jesus Christ, true God and true Man. Blessed be the Name of Jesus. Blessed be his Most Sacred Heart. Blessed be his Most Precious Blood. Blessed be Jesus in the Most Holy Sacrament of the Altar. Blessed be the Holy Spirit, the Paraclete. Blessed be the great Mother of God, Mary most Holy. Blessed be St. Joseph, her spouse most chaste. Blessed be God in his Angels and in his Saints.

## Reposition

After the blessing the minister who gave the blessing, or another priest or deacon, replaces the Blessed Sacrament in the tabernacle. Meanwhile all sing the following hymn:

# Fr Steven will be commissioned by Bishop Denise Ferguson during Mass on Wednesday 29 June, the Feast of St Peter and St Paul, at 7 pm.

#### Fr Steven writes:

I am delighted to have received the Archbishop's invitation to be Parish Priest at St Mary Magdalene. I am grateful for the confidence shown in me by the Nomination committee. And I am looking forward to the Commissioning on 29 June. Above all, I consider it a privilege to be part of this compassionate faith community. So, let's do something wonderful together.

**Following the Commissioning on 29 June there will be hospitality in the Mission Hall.** Catherine Freriks has kindly offered to coordinate the catering, so please speak to her if you are able to assist.

**Fr Steven** is a member of the **Australia and New Zealand Association of Theological Studies** and will be presenting two papers at the Association's annual conference in Sydney in the first week of July. Congratulations Fr Steven!

The theme of the conference in 2022 is "Future Theology". The aim of this conference theme is to provoke reflection on what future theology in its various disciplines might say and do, as well as what its future context might look like. While attempts to anticipate the future are inevitably speculative, the likely continuation of current trends and trajectories provides rich material for deliberation; indeed, thinking creatively about 'future theology' may even help generate and stimulate that future thinking itself.

A major emphasis for the conference is that theology—whatever its brave new world—might be not just a voice of caution, but a creative, constructive, and contributory voice, speaking hopefully into public discourse, the academy, and its ecclesial domains.

Fr Steven is also a member of the Australasian Society for Continental Philosophy. The Society aims to foster interest and support research in the field of Continental/European philosophy, understood in a broad and interdisciplinary sense, in Australia, New Zealand, and in the Australasian region, and to provide a network for those interested in and/or working in this field both nationally and internationally.

The Society endeavours to promote the interdisciplinary exchange of ideas inspired by the diverse traditions of European thought (such as phenomenology, existentialism, critical theory, hermeneutics, feminism, deconstruction, poststructuralism, and so on), and to develop productive links with other international societies and associations that share similar goals and views. Fr Steven plans to present a paper at the 2022 annual conference, to be held in Melbourne from 28-30 November.
