



In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; this is the pledge of our inheritance towards redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory.

I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love towards all the saints, and for this reason I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers. I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power. God put this power to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come. And he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.





Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.


It is right to give him thanks and praise.

It is truly right and just, our duty and our salvation, always and everywhere to give you thanks, holy Father, almighty and eternal God.


Today we keep the festival of your holy city, the heavenly Jerusalem, our mother, where around your throne the saints, our brothers and sisters, sing your praise for ever.

Remember our brothers and sisters who have gone to their rest in the sure hope of rising again; bring them and all who have died in your mercy into the light of your presence.





The Breaking of the Bread


The priest breaks the bread, saying

ROWAN WILLIAMS ON THE SAINTS

The saints are not to be understood as rare examples of human beings who are able to live up to the standard set by theological norms; nor are they primarily rare instances when even the "realistic" voice has to agree with the "proclamatory" voice. Rather, the saints challenge the presuppositions of the "realistic" voice. They witness to a world that is willed by God, and it is thus a world that differs in purpose from what the "realistic" voice would believe. From that world a certain politics follows, one which will have points of contact with the kinds of politics that are possible in a world unaware of its divine origins, but which will also show important differences.

The church exists in a God-willed world. To fail to speak of the church in a way that shows how it can be a means for God to exist in the world would be a theological failure. It would be to allow a world that is unaware of its God-willed-ness to dictate how God can be present in his world. Without such proclamative talk, the church is realistically impossible.

The same is true for the Christian talk of eternity. The saints are examples of human lives that indicate that the world cannot be described accurately using merely a realistic voice. The saints' lives, rooted in eternity, deepen the meaning that arises from their finite existence, and enable them to exhibit meaningfulness even in the face of the utter meaninglessness of human evil.

The saint is someone who embodies a tradition in a way that goes beyond divisions of time and eternity, practicality and proclamation, because it presupposes a different world from the one where various secular ideologies are the dominating options. When we are looking at the saints – with awe and amazement – our world begins to change, and thus a different kind of politics becomes visible and possible.

In the moment after taking communion, let us look at our neighbours, too, with awe and amazement. This is a moment when the "is" and the "ought" overlap completely, and where it is possible to catch a glimpse of the world as Christianity claims God sees it. This is reality, where the eternal breaks into the temporal. Thanks be to God!

Life, loss, and hope

(I'm spiritual but not religious)

WORKSHOP-RETREAT, SATURDAY 3 DECEMBER 2022 ST MARY MAGDALENE'S MOORE STREET 10 AM - 4 PM

This workshop/retreat will introduce a developmental way of exploring the sacred. This recognizes the complexities of the human journey and the importance of developing our own sense of self. For example, for those from the Christian tradition, this can be about leaving the Sunday School God behind and developing an authentic sense of the self and a new sense of the sacred.

So, the workshop-retreat will consider the possibility of outgrowing inadequate and/or dysfunctional religious and family systems. The day will be a mix of times for quiet reflection and positive interaction. The key theme is the recognition that sometimes we need a new way of thinking to bring about personal change, and deep change involves a respectful attention to the experience of loss.

Of course, each group is different. Typically, however, these are the kind of issues to be addressed.

- Life as a (very complicated) journey
- Exploring new perspectives
- Change and the wilderness experience
- The wilderness as a time and place for renewal
- Change raises issues around loss

- Grief is complicated
- Saying goodbye
- The rhythm of life
- A community of friends
- Discerning our true vocation
