

Tonight we begin the Great Three Days of our Lord's passion, death and resurrection, the journey from the supper table to the cross, from the cross to Easter dawn.

We are followers in Jesus' way, exploring Jesus' truth, encountering Jesus' life.

This is the night when Christ the Lamb of God was given into the hands of betrayers.

This is the night when Christ gathered with the disciples in the upper room.

This is the night when Christ our Lord gave us this holy feast, that as we break the bread and drink the cup we may here proclaim the holy sacrifice, and come at the last to the Lord's table in heaven.

This is the night when Christ took a towel and washed the disciples' feet, showing us how to honour and serve one another in love.

This is the night for watching and prayer.

We give ourselves freely to the demands of these great days, confident that those who die in Christ will surely be made alive.

Penitential Act

God shows great love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us.

A brief pause for silence follows.

Let us then confess our sins in penitence and faith.

Lord Jesus, you raise the dead to life in the Spirit:

Lord, have mercy. \mathbf{R} . Lord, have mercy.

Lord Jesus, you bring pardon and peace to the sinner:

Christ, have mercy. **R**. Christ, have mercy.

Lord Jesus, you bring light to those in darkness:

Lord, have mercy. \mathbf{R} . Lord, have mercy.

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading

A reading from the book of Exodus.

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbour in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it.


This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the LORD. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgements: I am the LORD. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt. This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the LORD; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, 'Lord, are you going to wash my feet?' Jesus answered, 'You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand.' Peter said to him, 'You will never wash my feet.' Jesus answered, 'Unless I wash you, you have no share with me.' Simon Peter said to him, 'Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!' Jesus said to him, 'One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you.' For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, 'Not all of you are clean.'

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, 'Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord – and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, our Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, "Where I am going, you cannot come." I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.'

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give him thanks and praise.


It is truly right and just, our duty and our salvation,

And so, with angels and archangels, with all the heavenly host, we proclaim your glory and join their unending chorus of praise:





Lord, you are holy indeed, and all creation rightly gives you praise. All life, all holiness comes from you through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, by the working of the Holy Spirit. From age to age you gather a people to yourself, so that from the rising of the sun to its setting a pure offering may be made to the glory of your name.

And so, Lord God, we humbly pray: by the power of your Spirit sanctify these gifts we have brought before you, that they may become the body and blood of your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, at whose command we celebrate this eucharist.

On this night,

the night he was handed over to death, Jesus washed the feet of his disciples and gave us a new commandment: to love one another as he has loved us. He took bread and gave you thanks and praise; he broke the bread, gave it to his disciples, and said: Take this, all of you, and eat it: This is my Body, which will be given up for you.

When supper was ended, he took the cup; again he gave you thanks and praise, gave the cup to his disciples, and said: Take this, all of you, and drink from it: this is the cup of my Blood, the Blood of the new and everlasting covenant. It will be shed for you and for all, so that sins may be forgiven. Do this in memory of me.

Calling to mind, Lord God, the death your Son endured for our salvation, his glorious resurrection and ascension into heaven, and eagerly awaiting the day of his return, we offer you in thanksgiving this holy and living sacrifice.

Look with favour on your Church's offering and see the Victim by whose sacrifice you were pleased to reconcile us to yourself. Grant that we who are nourished by the body and blood of your Son may be filled with his Holy Spirit and become one body, one spirit in Christ.

Let him make us an everlasting gift to you, that we may share in the inheritance of your saints, with Mary, the virgin Mother of God, with the apostles, the martyrs, Saint Mary Magdalene, and all your saints, on whose constant intercession we rely for help.

Lord, may this sacrifice

which has made our peace with you

advance the peace and salvation of all the world.

Strengthen in faith and love your pilgrim Church on earth:

your servant our Primate and Bishop Geoffrey,

all bishops, priests, and deacons,

all ministers of your Church,

and the entire people your Son has gained for you.

Merciful Father,

hear the prayers of the family you have gathered here before you, and unite to yourself all your children

in the unity of the Holy Spirit,




THE COMMUNION RITE


The Breaking of the Bread

The celebrant breaks the bread, saying

Unless a grain of wheat falls into the ground and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies it bears much fruit.

If we have died with him, we shall live with him.

While the bread is broken Agnus Dei is sung.



Invitation to Communion

Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb.

Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word, and I shall be healed.

Come let us take this holy sacrament of the body and blood of Christ in remembrance that he died for us, and feed on him in our hearts by faith with thanksgiving.

All receive Holy Communion.

Communion will be administered in one kind only.

Communicants are asked to approach in single file, maintaining physical distance, returning to their places via the side aisles.

Those who are not to receive the Blessed Sacrament are invited to unite themselves with Jesus by making a Spiritual Communion.

Act of Spiritual Communion

My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the most Blessed Sacrament. I love You above all things and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot now receive You sacramentally, come spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there, and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.

During Communion, the choir will sing anthems.

After the distribution of Communion, a ciborium with hosts for Communion on the following day is left on the altar. The Priest says the Prayer after Communion.

Prayer after Communion


Let us pray.

THE TRANSFER OF THE MOST BLESSED SACRAMENT

Procession to the Altar of Repose

The celebrant, accompanied by the ministers, carries the Blessed Sacrament in procession to the place where it is to be kept until the Liturgy of Good Friday, while the following hymn is sung:



 Hail our Saviour's glorious Body which his Virgin Mother bore; Hail the Blood which, shed for sinners, did a broken world restore; Hail the sacrament most holy, St Alphonsus Liguori

Flesh and Blood of Christ adore!

- 2 To the Virgin, for our healing, his own Son the Father sends; from the Father's love proceeding, Sower, Seed and Word descends; wondrous life of Word incarnate with his greatest wonder ends!
- On that paschal evening see him with the chosen twelve recline, to the old law still obedient in its feast of love divine; Love divine, the new law giving, gives himself as Bread and Wine!
- 4 By his word the Word almighty makes of bread his flesh indeed;
 Wine becomes his very life-blood: Faith God's living Word must heed!
 Faith alone may safely guide us where the senses cannot lead!

When the procession reaches the place of reservation:

- 5 Come, adore this wondrous presence; bow to Christ, the source of grace! Here is kept the ancient promise of God's earthly dwelling-place! Sight is blind before God's glory, Faith alone may see his face!
- 6 Glory be to God the Father, praise to his co-equal Son, adoration to the Spirit, bond of love, in Godhead one!
 Blest be God by all creation joyously while ages run. Amen.
