


Commemoration of the 650th anniversary of Julian of Norwich and the *Revelations of Divine Love*



The priest addresses the congregation.





THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading

1st Vision, Chapter 5

A reading from the Revelations of Divine Love.

Our good Lord showed me a spiritual sight of his familiar love. I saw that he is to us everything which is good and comforting for our help. He is our clothing, who wraps and enfolds us for love, embraces us and shelters us, surrounds us for his love, which is so tender that he may never desert us. And so in this sight I saw that he is everything which is good, as I understand.

And in this he showed me something small, no bigger than a hazelnut, lying in the palm of my hand, as it seemed to me, and it was as round as a ball. I looked at it and thought: What can this be? I was amazed that it could last, for I thought that because of its littleness it would suddenly have fallen away into nothing. And I was answered in my understanding: It lasts and always will, because God loves it; and thus everything has being through the love of God.

In this little thing I saw three properties. The first is that God made it, the second is that God loves it, the third is that God preserves it. But what did I see in it? It is that God is the Creator and the protector and the lover. For until I am substantially united to him, I can never have perfect rest or true happiness, until, that is, I am so attached to him that there can be no created thing between my God and me.

Second Reading

A reading from the first letter of Peter.

Beloved, I urge you as aliens and exiles to abstain from the desires of the flesh that wage war against the soul. Conduct yourselves honourably among the gentiles, so that, though they malign you as evildoers, they may see your honourable deeds and glorify God when he comes to judge.

For the Lord's sake be subject to every human authority, whether to the emperor as supreme, or to governors as sent by him to punish those who do wrong and to praise those who do right. For it is God's will that by doing right you should silence the ignorance of the foolish. As servants of God, live as free people, yet do not use your freedom as a pretext for evil.

Honour everyone. Love the family of believers. Fear God. Honour the emperor. Slaves, accept the authority of your masters with all respect, not only those who are kind and gentle

but also those who are dishonest. For it is a commendable thing if, being aware of God, you endure pain while suffering unjustly. If you endure when you are beaten for doing wrong, what credit is that? But if you endure when you do good and suffer for it, this is a commendable thing before God. For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you should follow in his steps.

He committed no sin,

and no deceit was found in his mouth.'

When he was abused, he did not return abuse; when he suffered, he did not threaten, but he entrusted himself to the one who judges justly. He himself bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that, having died to sins, we might live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed. For you were going astray like sheep, but now you have returned to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.



The Lord be with you. **And also with you.**


Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord.

On the night he was handed over to the authorities, Jesus took bread, gave thanks, broke it, and said, 'This is my body, which is for you. Do this to remember me.' In the same way also, the cup, after supper, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this whenever you drink it, to remember me.'



Praise and love be yours, this day and all days, from us and all people and from all of creation as we say, in songs of never-ending praise:



The Lord's Prayer


As our Saviour Christ has taught us we are confident to pray:

The Breaking of the Bread


The priest breaks the bread, saying

Invitation to Communion

Behold the Lamb of God,

All receive Holy Communion. Communion will be administered in one kind only. Communicants are asked to approach in single file, maintaining physical distance, returning to their places via the side aisles.

Those who are not to receive the Blessed Sacrament are invited to unite themselves with Jesus by making a Spiritual Communion.



650TH ANNIVERSARY OF JULIAN OF NORWICH

Julian of Norwich has become England's most widely known female visionary. In May 1373, when she was thirty years old, she experienced a series of sixteen visions or 'shewings' which revealed aspects of the love of God. Following her recovery, she spent the rest of her life pondering their meaning and implications and recording her insights in writing. Her *Revelations of Divine Love* is a spiritual classic, known and loved by millions, and a guide to many in the way of faith, hope and love.

Devotion to Julian has steadily increased over the years, and here in Adelaide we have long had the presence of the Julian Centre, under Fr Philip's direction.

We will commemorate this truly remarkable woman during Mass today, giving thanks for the 650th anniversary of the 'shewings' which Julian received, and for her spiritual teaching and holy wisdom. Sister Juliana—whose name in religious life honours Julian—is celebrating, and Fr Philip is preaching.

ADULT FAITH LEARNING - A COURSE IN MAY

Fr Steven writes ... In troubled times, we need hope for the future and wisdom for daily living. To this end, theological reflection can play an important role in the discernment of wisdom and hope.

In fact, many of us have theological skills we are not aware of. To this end, I will be facilitating a sixweek course. Our text will be a book I wrote years ago called I Met God in Bermuda. The book is a mix of anecdote and theological insights. It is available via ebay.com.au and amazon.com.au. This course is for the brave-hearted. And the aim of the course is to increase participants confidence, knowledge, and skills in the discernment of wisdom for the day.

Julian of Norwich

Celebrating on May 8, 2023 the 650th Anniversary of Julian's Revelations of Divine Love

Fr Philip Carter writes ...

"There is no doubt that Lady Julian is the greatest of the English mystics. Not only that, but she is one of the greatest English theologians in the ancient sense of the word". For Thomas Merton, Julian is a "true theologian", "one whose prayer is true", and in whom there is no split between theology and spirituality.

For a good part of her life, Julian lived as a recluse or anchoress, in a cell attached to St. Julian's church (from which she probably took her name). She was an "anchored presence" in the midst of her world, her life a challenge to the activism of ordinary people and a symbol of stability and faith.

During her life time there was much political and theological change: it was a time of the Hundred Years War, the Black Death, and the Papal Schism. It was a time of moral and doctrinal corruption and confusion- yet it was also the time of Chaucer (The Canterbury Tales) and Langland (Piers Plowman), offering, though not achieving, reform through their works of satire and laughter. It was also a time for mystics, and alongside Julian, there are the writings of Richard Rolle, Margery Kempe, Walter Hilton and *The Cloud of Unknowing*.

650 years ago, on May 8, 1373, Julian was at the point of death, and her pain suddenly left her and she experienced a series of 16 wonderful "showings" (as she called them), began. These revelations of God's love centred on the Cross of Jesus. She reflected on them for 20 years, after recording them in a short book (which still exists), and then wrote a longer text of profound depth and wisdom, exploring the meaning of such revelations.

She has been described as "the mother of English prose" for her *Revelations of Divine Love*: it is the first book written in English by a woman.

Quotes from The Revelations of Divine Love

He showed me a little thing, the size of a hazelnut, in the palm of my hand, and it was as round as a ball ... In this little thing I saw three truths. The first is that God made it. The second is that God loves it. The third is that God looks after it. (Long Text 5)

He did not say: "You will not be troubled" or "You shall not have bitter labour" or "You will have no discomfort", but "You will not be overcome". God wills that we pay attention to this truth and that we be ever strong in faithful trust, in well-being and woe. (LT 68)

Our Lord looks at his servant with pity, not with blame. (LT 82)

I saw in truth that our Lord was never angry, and never will be. For He is God, goodness, life, truth, love and peace. (LT 46)

Sin is necessary, but all shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well. (LT 27)

For in every soul that shall be saved, there is a godly will that never assented to sin, and never shall. (LT 37)

Peace and love are always in us, living and working, but we are not always in peace and in love. (LT 39)

I am He who makes you to love. I am He who makes you to long; I am he, the endless fulfilling of all true desires. (LT 59)

He is our clothing, who, for love, wraps us up, holds us close; He entirely encloses us for tender love, so that He may never leave us, since He is the source of all good things for us, as I understand it. (LT 5)

As God is truly our Father, so just as truly is He our Mother. (LT 59)

God of Your goodness, give me Yourself, for You are enough for me. I can ask for nothing less that is completely to Your honour, and if I do ask anything less, I shall always be in want. Only in You do I have all. (LT 5)

For in God's sight we do not fall; in our own sight we do not stand, and both of these are true as I see it. The way our Lord sees is the higher truth. (LT 82)
