When he had made purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high, having become as much superior to angels as the name he has inherited is more excellent than theirs.

For to which of the angels did God ever say, 'You are my Son; today I have begotten you'? Or again, 'I will be his Father, and he will be my Son'? And again, when he brings the firstborn into the world, he says, 'Let all God's angels worship him.'

Of the angels he says, 'He makes his angels winds, and his servants flames of fire.' But of the Son he says, 'Your throne, O God, is for ever and ever, and the righteous sceptre is the sceptre of your kingdom. You have loved righteousness and hated wickedness; therefore God, your God, has anointed you with the oil of gladness beyond your companions.' And, 'In the beginning, Lord, you founded the earth, and the heavens are the work of your hands; they will perish, but you remain; they will all wear out like clothing; like a cloak you will roll them up, and like clothing they will be changed. But you are the same, and your years will never end.'


It is right to give him thanks and praise.

After supper, he took the cup, and again giving you thanks he gave it to his disciples, saying, 'This is my blood of the new covenant shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me'.

And so, in remembrance of his birth, his offering of himself made once for all upon the cross, his mighty resurrection and exaltation, we offer ourselves in praise and thanksgiving as a holy and living sacrifice.

Make us one with Christ and with each other, and one in service to all the world, until the day of final glory comes and we feast at his heavenly banquet with all your saints for ever.




The Lord's Prayer

The Breaking of the Bread


The celebrant breaks the bread, saying

All receive Holy Communion. Communicants should approach in single file, maintaining physical distance, returning via the side aisles.

Those who are not to receive the Blessed Sacrament are invited to unite themselves with Jesus by making a Spiritual Communion.



CHRISTMAS DAY

People of Luke's world listening to the Christmas story would know that it wasn't really celebrating a baby; it was celebrating who that baby became and is. Stories of great heroes often began with accounts of their wondrous birth coloured to evoke their later achievements. People of Luke's day would also have sensed that the story was subversive, especially if they were familiar with Rome's propaganda. For it hailed the Emperor as Son of God and made much of the Empire's achievements in enabling travel safe by eliminating bandits on land and pirates at sea. It had brought "peace on earth" and declared itself "good news" for all. Instead, Luke gives a very different version of good news. A baby, about to be just a statistic in a census, and put in an animals' feeder box, is Son of God. And angels declare to simple shepherds a new kind of "good news", touting the child as the one to bring "peace on earth". Luke was expanding upon what was already subversive and absurd, namely, that a man cursed, hanging on an execution cross, was truly the Son of God, wildly absurd! And Jews, steeped in ancient stories which gave the hope that one day a shepherd king like David might arise to crush Rome would also sense a challenge. Luke invites us to celebrate who Jesus is, bearer of God's Light for the world, shining love and hope to homeless people forced to camp far from home, like the huge number now in camps along the Thai-Burma border. Our challenge is to make that light visible by our giving.
