Acknowledgement of Country. 




Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.'







Come let us take this holy sacrament of the body and blood of Christ in remembrance that he died for us, and feed on him in our hearts by faith with thanksgiving.

All receive Holy Communion. Communion will be administered in one kind only. Communicants should approach in single file, maintaining physical distance, returning via the side aisles. Communicants should remove their face masks immediately prior to receiving Holy Communion, replacing them afterwards.

Those who are not to receive the Blessed Sacrament are invited to unite themselves with Jesus by making a Spiritual Communion.

APPOINTMENT OF LOCUM PRIEST



The Churchwardens are delighted to announce the appointment of the Revd Dr Steven Ogden as Locum Priest from 2 January 2022. Fr Steven's appointment is on a part time basis for a period of 6 months.

Fr Steven is known to many members of the community, both from a few recent supply turns on Sundays and weekdays, and during his previous time in the Diocese of Adelaide, especially as Dean of St Peter's Cathedral from 2000-2009. He was subsequently Principal of St Francis' Theological College, Brisbane from 2009-2016.

Fr Steven is a Research Fellow in the Centre for Public and Contextual Theology at Charles Sturt University. His research interests include political theology, political philosophy, gender-based violence, power-relations, entitlement, and masculinity. His most recent book, *Violence, Entitlement, and Politics: A Theology on Transforming the Subject* was published by Routledge in September this year.

Please pray for Fr Steven as he embarks on this new ministry, and for the parish community as it continues to explore the options for ministry in the city in the years to come.

Fr Gwilm Henry-Edwards has made a tremendous contribution since his appointment as Locum Priest in March 2021, supporting the Parish Council and the parish community as we prepare for what we hope will be the last of locum appointment in anticipation of the commencement of a formal nomination process in the coming months. **We will have a celebration of his ministry after Mass next Sunday, 19 December**, as the following week will be largely overshadowed by Christmas celebrations!

NATIONAL CHURCH LIFE SURVEY 2021

The National Church Life Survey (NCLS) has been conducted ever 5 years since 1991. This Australian initiative is a world leader in research focused on connecting churches and their communities. Research has examined well-being, spirituality and church health, and with 7 surveys now completed, valuable long-term data has been generated. Cooperating denominations, including Catholics, Anglicans and Protestants, are a network for sharing practical resources to help churches and communities.

Regular worshippers will recall that we completed a Survey only a couple of years ago. That is correct – the Diocese of Adelaide commissioned a special "out of cycle" round of the NCLS to give base-line data as the Diocese developed the "Vision 2022" five year plan. This NCLS collection, in 2021, is the regular 5-yearly version.

The survey can be completed in writing or online. Hard copy surveys will be available today and for the next few weeks.

CONGREGATIONAL SINGING RESUMES

While the current COVID-19 restrictions have remained in force, the Parish Council has determined that congregational singing should be paused. The re-opening of State borders on 23 November has brought with it a renewed emphasis on COVID-safe practice in the community, and requirements such as the wearing of face masks in shared public places – including churches – is likely to be reinforced for the time being. This is especially important in this week when we are experiencing significant outbreaks of COVID-19 in the community.

We have all missed the opportunity to lift up our voices in praise of God, and the Parish Council has therefore decided that congregational singing will resume. **The wearing of face masks is obligatory throughout Mass other than at the time of receiving Communion**. The exceptions are readers and those leading the prayers of the people, when they are actually reading or leading prayers, and the presiding clergy when they are leading worship.

So please remember, bring your face masks! Should you forget, don't worry: disposable masks will be available.

CHRISTMAS BOWL APPEAL

The Christmas Bowl is one of the longest standing Christmas appeals in Australia. It was established in 1949 by The Revd Frank Byatt to raise money for refugees after World War II. On Christmas Day that year, Frank put a Bowl of Remembrance on the dinner table and asked his family to place a gift inside to help those less fortunate than themselves. The Christmas Bowl was born. The very first Christmas Bowl raised £1,808 - no small sum at that time. Since that time, churches have raised more than \$100 million, illustrating the incredible impact that Australian churches can have when they work together.

The causes to which donations to Christmas Bowl will be applied in 2021 include supporting health clinics in Gaza, where protracted fighting, a blockade that makes it hard to access food or medicine, and COVID-19 hardships, have led to the closure of many clinics, and in particular an end to mental health support and counselling to help children deal with trauma.

ANGLICAN BOARD OF MISSION ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS APPEAL

Each year the Anglican Board of Mission – Australia holds an Advent and Christmas Appeal. The Advent appeal this year will be in aid of Wontulp-Bi-Buya College in North Queensland and Nungalinya College in Darwin. Wontulp-Bi-Buya College supports the development of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander church and community leaders through study programs leading to awards in theology, suicide prevention, addictions management and community development. Nungalinya College serves over 300 remote Indigenous students, most of whom are both church leaders and Elders with responsibilities in their own cultures. Indigenous Elders continually comment that they go there to grow in their faith, to be refreshed and renewed to go back home and continue to serve their people.

GAUDETE SUNDAY – REJOICE!

The 3rd Sunday in Advent is often called "Gaudete" Sunday in the Catholic tradition, after the first words of the Entrance Antiphon, "Gaudete in Domino semper" ("Rejoice in the Lord always").


The season of Advent originated in the early days of the Church as a fast of 40 days in preparation for Christmas. In the 9th century, the duration of Advent was reduced to four weeks (a period starting four Sundays before Christmas). Advent preserved most of the characteristics of a penitential season, which made it a kind of counterpart to Lent, including a break for "refreshment" in the middle of the season, when the disciplines of the season were slightly relaxed. (In Lent, the 4th Sunday in Lent Laetare Sunday, again from the words of the Entrance Antiphon, "Laetare Jerusalem" ("Rejoice, Jerusalem").

On Gaudete Sunday, rose-coloured vestments may be worn instead of violet (or deep blue, which is also worn in Advent in some traditions). On the Advent wreath, the candle for this Sunday is also rose-pink. The use of this colour, a "lighter" shade of the violet or blue of the season, is intended to be a visual reminder that the season of preparation is coming to a close and the great feast is swiftly approaching.

The colour is described, in liturgical books, as "rosacrea", and the spectrum is quite broad. Some are rich in hue, while others have more pink in the sense that is usually understood; a sort of pastel colour that comes about by mixing equal parts of red and white. Others have elements of orange or purple in them, or greater amounts of red than white. We are lucky enough to have vestments in this colour, and rejoice that we are able to adorn our worship of Almighty God with what beauty and splendour we can.
