Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. There they gave a dinner for him. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those at the table with him. Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, 'Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?' (He said this not because he cared about the poor, but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.) Jesus said, 'Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me.'

When the great crowd of the Jews learned that he was there, they came not only because of Jesus but also to see Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. So the chief priests planned to put Lazarus to death as well, since it was on account of him that many of the Jews were deserting and were believing in Jesus.

Reflection

The aromas of ointments were very important in ancient times. In some circumstances their importance continues. In the ancient world ointment aroma was a statement of unity, whereas now aromas are mostly to do with food and individuality.

The Gospel today tells of Mary of Bethany anointing Jesus' feet with oil. Its special fragrance alerts money-conscious Judas to the expense incurred by Mary to purchase the oil. But does Mary's oil have a particular meaning? It certainly would have to the ancient world. The sweetness of an aroma meant something good and something shared. This is somewhat beyond us in today's world. In restaurants, for example, we sit at separate tables and enjoy food aromas privately. A long time ago the aromas of good food would have been a joyous smell which brought lots of people together as they dined.

But the aroma of Mary's ointment is to be transformed into something greater than human life – just as the bread and wine in the Mass are transformed. Mary anoints Jesus' feet for burial. Jesus' death on the cross and resurrection will lead us into our share of the

divine life. In this divine life we smell the wonderful fragrance of the prodigal goodness of the living God.

This can be a good day to reflect on the influence and impressions we make on others. Are we sources of encouragement or discouragement? Do we inspire or deflate others? In other words, is the aroma we exude sweet or sour?

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Holy and gracious God, accept our sacrifice of praise, through your Son our Saviour Jesus Christ; who on the night he was handed over to suffering and death, took bread and gave you thanks, saying to his disciples, 'Take, and eat: this is my body which will be given for you.'

In the same way he took the cup, saying, 'This is my blood which will be shed for you. When you do this, you do it in memory of me.'

In remembrance of his death and resurrection, with this bread and this cup, we give you thanks that you have counted us worthy to stand in your presence and serve you.

Send your Holy Spirit upon the celebration of your Church: gather into one all who share in these holy mysteries, filling them with your Spirit and confirming them in the truth, that together we may praise you and give you glory through Jesus your servant. All glory and honour are yours, Father and Son, with the Holy Spirit in the holy Church, now and for ever. **Amen.**
