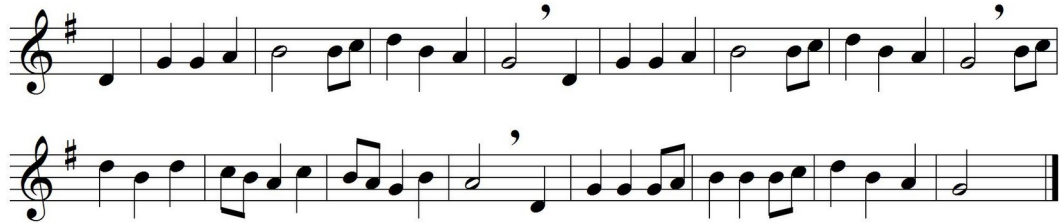

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading

Genesis 24.34–38, 42–49, 58–67

A reading from the book of Genesis.

The servant whom Abraham had sent said to Laban: ‘I am Abraham’s servant. The LORD has greatly blessed my master, and he has become wealthy; he has given him flocks and herds, silver and gold, male and female slaves, camels and donkeys. And Sarah my master’s wife bore a son to my master when she was old; and he has given him all that he has. My master made me swear, saying, “You shall not take a wife for my son from the daughters of the Canaanites, in whose land I live; but you shall go to my father’s house, to my kindred, and get a wife for my son.”

I came today to the spring, and said, “O LORD, the God of my master Abraham, if now you will only make successful the way I am going! I am standing here by the spring of water; let the young woman who comes out to draw, to whom I shall say, ‘Please give me a little water from your jar to drink,’ and who will say to me, ‘Drink, and I will draw for your camels also’ – let her be the woman whom the LORD has appointed for my master’s son.”

Before I had finished speaking in my heart, there was Rebekah coming out with her water jar on her shoulder; and she went down to the spring, and drew. I said to her, “Please let me drink.” She quickly let down her jar from her shoulder, and said, “Drink, and I will also water your camels.” So I drank, and she also watered the camels. Then I asked her, “Whose daughter are you?” She said, “The daughter of Bethuel, Nahor’s son, whom Milcah bore to him.” So I put the ring on her nose, and the bracelets on her arms. Then I bowed my head and worshipped the LORD, and blessed the LORD, the God of my master Abraham, who had led me by the right way to obtain the daughter of my master’s kinsman for his son. Now then, if you will deal loyally and truly with my master, tell me; and if not, tell me, so that I may turn either to the right hand or to the left.’

And they called Rebekah, and said to her, ‘Will you go with this man?’ She said, ‘I will.’ So they sent away their sister Rebekah and her nurse along with Abraham’s servant and his men. And they blessed Rebekah and said to her, ‘May you, our sister, become thousands of myriads; may your offspring gain possession of the gates of their foes.’ Then Rebekah and her maids rose up, mounted the camels, and followed the man; thus the servant took Rebekah, and went his way.

Now Isaac had come from Beer-lahai-roi, and was settled in the Negeb. Isaac went out in the evening to walk in the field; and looking up, he saw camels coming. And Rebekah looked up, and when she saw Isaac, she slipped quickly from the camel, and said to the servant, ‘Who is the man over there, walking in the field to meet us?’ The servant said, ‘It is my master.’ So she took her veil and covered herself. And the servant told Isaac all the things that he had done. Then Isaac brought her into his mother Sarah’s tent. He took Rebekah, and she became his wife; and he loved her. So Isaac was comforted after his mother’s death.

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Romans.

I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate. Now if I do what I do not want, I agree that the law is good. But in fact it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me. For I know that nothing good dwells within me, that is, in my flesh. I can will what is right, but I cannot do it. For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I do. Now if I do what I do not want, it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me. So I find it to be a law that when I want to do what is good, evil lies close at hand. For I delight in the law of God in my inmost self, but I see in my members another law at war with the law of my mind, making me captive to the law of sin that dwells in my members. Wretched man that I am! Who will rescue me from this body of death? Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord!

Homily

Belief and Unbelief – Is there a God-given choice?

Everyone in our society has a choice: to be a person of faith or unbelief. The choice we make depends on so many factors – upbringing, good and bad experiences of church, the influence of friends and work colleagues, and others. Is it, however, our own choice in the end? The Gospel reading today suggests that some are chosen by God to believe while others are not.

This poses a great difficulty for us because we prefer to think that everyone can be person of faith potentially. We find it hard to imagine God deliberately choosing to make someone an unbeliever. It does not fit our notions of justice and kindness.

As always we need to remember that our notions of justice are not necessarily the same as God’s. We should not make God according to our own convictions. However, we need to look more closely at this Gospel reading.

Is there a principle underlining God’s choices here? Far from trying to understand God in any prescriptive sense, it does seem that God hides the truth from wise and the learned people and instead, reveals the truth to people who are humble and lowly. We can see

here that many wise and learned people can be arrogant and proud and quite possibly be unable to repent because of this. It is nothing to do with God being selective in any arbitrary sense or vindictive.

The key to God's welcome and gift of faith is that we need to be conscious of our need of God's grace and equally conscious of our own failings. Such consciousness makes us more humble with no room for any arrogance.

Interestingly, Jesus calls us to take on his yoke which he says is easy to bear. The law of Jesus' yolk is love. Our sins are forgiven and now the task is to love another without worrying about unnecessary matters. The law of love is easy to learn, Jesus says unless we make it more difficult for ourselves.

In answer to the question about belief and unbelief, a first step towards finding an answer is to look carefully and critically at oneself. To what extent, if any, am I putting myself out of contention for belief? Am I truly receptive to the Gospel or do I tend strongly to have too much faith in myself?

Silence may be kept.
