

All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, 'What does this mean?' But others sneered and said, 'They are filled with new wine.' But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, 'Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

"In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy. And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist. The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day. Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

He will glorify me, because he will take what is mine and declare it to you. All that the Father has is mine. For this reason I said that he will take what is mine and declare it to you.'

Homily

Renewal of Baptismal Promises

Dear People of God: on this Day of Pentecost, the Church calls us to celebrate the gifts of the Spirit. As a sign of our Baptism in the Spirit, let us reaffirm and renew the solemn promises and vows of Holy Baptism which bind us to Christ and to each other.

Do you reaffirm your renunciation of evil and renew your commitment to Jesus Christ?

I do.

Do you believe in God the Father?

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose from the dead; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father; from there he will come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.



Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give our thanks and praise.


All glory and honour, be yours now and always, mighty Creator, everliving God.

Let us proclaim the my-ste-ry of faith. Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come a-gain.





The Breaking of the Bread


The priest breaks the bread, saying



Celebrating Corpus Christi – Thursday 3 June at 7 pm



On the Feast of Corpus Christi – from the Latin meaning "Body of Christ" – we celebrate the Sacrament of the Body and Blood of Christ. In the catholic tradition, the Eucharist is central in the life of the Church.

The Second Vatican Council calls the Eucharist the "source and summit of the Christian life". It is the *source*, because the Eucharist enables us to *make present and offer anew* Christ's one redemptive Sacrifice of Calvary, which began with his Passion. It is the *summit*, because the Eucharist is truly a foretaste of heaven, in which we partake of Jesus' body and blood as heaven and earth become most profoundly one.

We have for many years invited priests and people from around the Diocese to join us on this day to celebrate how Christ gave us his body to be our spiritual food and to pray for Christ's body the Church, spread throughout the world, and especially in our part of the city.

The Mass this year will be on Thursday 3 June at 7 pm.

The Corpus Christi Mass is quite a spectacle, featuring a concelebration between the visiting clergy, a procession which goes (weather permitting) out into the street, and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. Of the Corpus Christi procession, Pope Francis has said: *The procession expresses our gratitude for the whole journey that God has made us travel through the desert of our poverty, to deliver us from servitude, and nourish us with love through the Sacrament of his Body and his Blood. In the procession, we walk with Jesus. These are the two inseparable aspects of today's feast, two aspects that characterize the entire life of the Christian people: a people who adore God and a people who walk: who do not stand still, who journey!*

And our celebrations in the Church are, of course, followed by a reception in the Mission Hall!

Extinguishing the Paschal Candle on the Feast of Pentecost



The blessing of the Paschal Candle (from the Latin *paschalis*, from *pascha* 'feast of Passover', via Greek and Aramaic from the Hebrew *Pesaḥ*) occurs at the Easter Vigil.

The Paschal Candle represents the Paschal mystery, which pertains to all the things that God sent Jesus to accomplish on earth - the passion, death and resurrection.

This mystery is at the centre of our faith and explains why the Paschal Candle is lit during the Easter season.

It also explains why the Paschal Candle remains in the church all year long and why it is lit at important times, especially baptisms and funerals. It is a symbol of the very basis of the church and its beliefs.

Fire has long been a sign of God's presence. The Old Testament is full of examples: the burning bush on Mount Sinai, the pillar of fire in the desert, the tabernacle lamps, and the sacrificial fires on the altar of the temple in Jerusalem.

Early Christians rather naturally viewed the kindling of new fire as a symbol of the presence of their resurrected Lord, the new pillar of fire. In Jerusalem, the earliest Christians blessed and lighted candles every Saturday night. By at least the fifth or sixth century, the custom had become associated with celebrations of the Resurrection, and paschal candles had found their way into the liturgy of the Western church.

In the medieval church, allegorical meaning was ascribed to every aspect of the paschal candle. Unlighted, it represented Christ's death and burial; lighted, it represented the splendor and glory of Christ's resurrection. The wick represented Christ's humanity, and the halo of flame represented his divinity. Other candles lighted from the paschal candle symbolized Christ giving the Holy Spirit to the disciples.

(There are a number of customs surrounding the blessing of the candle. The dates of the current year are inscribed in the candle, with accompanying prayers, as are the letters alpha and omega – the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet, "the beginning and the end". Five grains of incense, often contained in decorative brass containers, are embedded in the candle to represent the five wounds of Jesus (the three nails that pierced his hands and feet, the spear thrust into his side, and the thorns that crowned his head). And the candle is lowered into the water as a symbol of the Holy Spirit infusing the water of Baptism.)

In our own time, the symbolism of Christ's triumph over the darkness of sin and death is preeminent. This symbolism is most apparent when the paschal candle is introduced each year to the congregation in the Easter Vigil on Easter Eve. When the Vigil begins, the church is dark, symbolic of the darkness of the sepulchre that held the crucified Christ. A new fire is kindled, and the paschal candle is lighted, representing the Risen Christ, the Light of the world.

Throughout the fifty days of Easter, the paschal candle traditionally stands near the altar as a symbol of the resurrection. It is lighted for each liturgy during the great fifty days of Easter. At least in theory, it burns continuously from the Vigil of Easter through Pentecost.

In years gone by, the Paschal Candle was extinguished after the reading of the gospel on the Ascension of our Lord, emphasising the historical presence of Jesus following the resurrection, rather than focusing on the presence of the Risen Christ in our time. More recently, the Paschal Candle remains lighted and central through the entire Easter season.
