Acknowledgement of Country. As a community, we recognise that the church is built and our worship is offered on the traditional lands of the Kaurna people, and close to Tarntanyangga (Victoria Square), which is still an important meeting place for the Kaurna people today. THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading

Esther 7.1–6, 9–10; 9.20–22

A reading from the book of Esther.

The king and Haman went in to feast with Queen Esther. On the second day, as they were drinking wine, the king again said to Esther, 'What is your petition, Queen Esther? It shall be granted you. And what is your request? Even to the half of my kingdom, it shall be fulfilled.' Then Queen Esther answered, 'If I have won your favour, O king, and if it pleases the king, let my life be given me – that is my petition – and the lives of my people – that is my request. For we have been sold, I and my people, to be destroyed, to be killed, and to be annihilated. If we had been sold merely as slaves, men and women, I would have held my peace; but no enemy can compensate for this damage to the king.' Then King Ahasuerus said to Queen Esther, 'Who is he, and where is he, who presumed to do this?' Esther said, 'A foe and enemy, this wicked Haman!' Then Haman was terrified before the king and queen.

Then Harbona, one of the eunuchs in attendance on the king, said, 'Look, the very gallows that Haman has prepared for Mordecai, whose word saved the king, stands at Haman's house, fifty cubits high.' And the king said, 'Hang him on that.' So they hanged Haman on the gallows that he had prepared for Mordecai. Then the anger of the king abated.

Mordecai recorded these things, and sent letters to all the Jews who were in all the provinces of King Ahasuerus, both near and far, enjoining them that they should keep the fourteenth day of the month Adar and also the fifteenth day of the same month, year by

year, as the days on which the Jews gained relief from their enemies, and as the month that had been turned for them from sorrow into gladness and from mourning into a holiday; that they should make them days of feasting and gladness, days for sending gifts of food to one another and presents to the poor.

Second Reading

A reading from the letter of James.

My beloved, do not swear, either by heaven or by earth or by any other oath, but let your "Yes" be yes and your "No" be no, so that you may not fall under condemnation.

Are any among you suffering? They should pray. Are any cheerful? They should sing songs of praise. Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord. The prayer of faith will save the sick, and the Lord will raise them up; and anyone who has committed sins will be forgiven. Therefore confess your sins to one another, and pray for one another, so that you may be healed. The prayer of the righteous is powerful and effective. Through Christ, with Christ, in Christ, and in the Spirit's grace, with heart and soul and mind and strength we love and worship you alone, O God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

Parish Consultation, Sunday 10 October

At the time of Fr Stephan Clark's retirement, the Wardens and Parish Council announced that the Parish would enter an extended period of part-time ministry during which rental revenue (including the Rectory) would be directed to the retirement of debt to the Synod Office, and steps were taken to ensure cash flow is sufficiently settled to enable a mature decision to be made on the options for ministry in the longer term.

We are pleased to announce that we have made excellent progress in addressing both issues, to the extent that the Diocese has advised that we may begin to look in earnest towards making an ongoing ministerial appointment in the first half of 2022.

VIOLENCE, ENTITLEMENT, AND POLITICS A THEOLOGY ON TRANSFORMING THE SUBJECT Steven G. Ogden

Congratulations to Fr Steven, whose book with the academic publisher Routledge, *Violence, Entitlement, and Politics: A Theology on Transforming the Subject* will be released this week.

This book is an exercise in political theology, exploring the problem of genderbased violence by focusing on violent male subjects and the issue of entitlement. It addresses gender-based violence in familial and military settings before engaging with a wider political context.

It is Fr Steven's second book for Routledge. His first, *The Church, Authority, and Foucault: Imagining the Church as an Open Space of Freedom* (2018) addressed the problem of the Church's enmeshment with sovereign power, which can lead to marginalization. He suggested that the Church needs to change in order to fulfil its vocation. Instead of a monarchy, what about Church as an open space of freedom?
