Dear friends.

The relaxation of Covid-19 restrictions makes it possible to once again worship on Sunday, when Mass is sung at 10 am. The church is also open for private prayer and public worship on Thursday from 11.30 am to 1 pm, and Mass is offered at 12.10 pm after the Angelus at 12 noon.

The decision to return to worship in community, even for private prayer, is not a straightforward matter, so we will continue to produce these newsletters for now.

In these Thursday newsletters, we offer ideas and opportunities for nourishing our personal and communal spiritual lives.

1. From Fr Gwilym – The Anglican Church of Australia – Constitution, Fundamental Declarations and Ruling Principles



We learnt in Tuesday's bulletin that the Anglican Church of Australia adopted a **Constitution** which sets out the beliefs and under-standings which hold it together. The current version of the Constitution dates from 1960, and since 1 January 1962 the Australian church has been an independent province within the worldwide Anglican Communion with its own Primate.

In the Constitution there are three Fundamental Declarations and three Ruling Principles. Every Diocese in Australia accepts this definition of the Anglican Church and every Bishop, Priest and Deacon is required to accept it as a condition of holding a Licence. So, here they are, straight out of the Constitution. I've numbered them in the hope of making them easier to read.

FUNDAMENTAL DECLARATIONS

- 1. The Anglican Church of Australia, being a part of the One Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church of Christ, holds the Christian Faith as professed by the Church of Christ from primitive times and in particular as set forth in the creeds known as the Nicene Creed and the Apostles' Creed.
- 2. This Church receives all the canonical scriptures of the Old and New Testaments as being the ultimate rule and standard of faith, given by inspiration of God and containing all things necessary for salvation.
- 3. This Church will ever obey the commands of Christ, teach His doctrine, administer His sacraments of Holy Baptism and Holy Communion, follow and uphold His discipline and preserve the three orders of bishops, priests and deacons in the sacred ministry.

RULING PRINCIPLES

1. This Church, being derived from the Church of England, retains and approves the doctrine and principles of the Church of England embodied in the Book of Common Prayer together with the Form and Manner of Making Ordaining and Consecrating of Bishops, Priests and Deacons and in the Articles of Religion sometimes called the Thirty-nine Articles; but has plenary authority at its own discretion to make statements as to the faith ritual ceremonial or discipline of this Church and to order its forms of worship and rules of discipline and to alter or revise such statements, forms and rules; provided that all such statements, forms, rules or alteration or revision thereof are consistent with the Fundamental Declarations contained herein and are made as prescribed by this Constitution.

Provided, and it is hereby further declared, that the above-named Book of Common Prayer, together with the Thirty-nine Articles, be regarded as the authorised standard of worship and doctrine in this Church, and no alteration in or permitted variations from the services or Articles therein contained shall contravene any principle of doctrine or worship laid down in such standard.

Provided further that until other order be taken by canon made in accordance with this Constitution, a bishop of a diocese may, at his discretion, permit such deviations from the existing order of service, not contravening any principle of doctrine or worship as aforesaid, as shall be submitted to him by the incumbent and churchwardens of a parish.

- 2. Subject to the Fundamental Declarations and the provisions of this chapter this Church has plenary authority and power to make canons, ordinances and rules for the order and good government of the Church, and to administer the affairs thereof. Such authority and power may be exercised by the several synods and tribunals in accordance with the provisions of this Constitution.
- 3. This Church will remain and be in communion with the Church of England in England and with churches in communion therewith so long as communion is consistent with the Fundamental Declarations contained in this Constitution.

2. Daily Prayer

Most Christian denominations have forms for prayer in the morning and the evening, and at other times of the day. Morning and Evening Prayer in the Anglican church's *A Prayer Book for Australia*, are available in either a fixed form (pages 3 - 33) or a different form for each day of the week (pages 383 - 424).

Online Resources

There is a complete online version of Daily Prayer from *A Prayer Book for Australia* for each day available at Australian Daily Prayer https://dailyprayer.ampers.x10.mx/. There is also a free app for mobile devices from the App Store or Google Play.

Times of Prayer

Many people find it helpful to make a particular time daily for prayer and reflection. One option might be to join your prayer with those of the wider world at some special times during

the day. While we cannot attend at the church at the present time, you may like to join the wider community in praying the <u>Angelus</u> at 9 am, 12 noon and 6 pm.

3. Reflections and Meditations

4. In the Church's Calendar

St Alban was the first known Christian martyr of Britain. Alban lived in the early third century in a Roman city close to where St Alban's Cathedral stands today. One day he gave shelter to a stranger fleeing from persecution. This stranger was a Christian priest: Alban was inspired by how important faith was to the priest and asked to be taught more about Christianity.

The Roman authorities soon caught up with the priest. However, Alban's new-found faith would not allow him to let the authorities arrest the priest. Instead, Alban exchanged clothes with him and was arrested, allowing the priest to escape. Alban refused to renounce his beliefs, declaring, "I worship and adore the true and living God who created all things,"



The magistrate ordered that he should receive the punishment intended for the escaped priest. Alban was led out of the city and up the hillside where he was beheaded. His grave on the hillside quickly became a place of pilgrimage. This story of an ordinary person, doing an extraordinary thing has endured and continues to inspire to this day.

5. For your prayers

We continue to pray throughout the week for the world and the church. These intentions may be helpful in your private or family prayers.

For the world. The leaders of the world as they seek to respond to the challenge of the COVID-19 pandemic. For refugees and asylum seekers, that they may find places of safety and welcome.

For the church. For all those who are challenged to be church in a different and unfamiliar way. In the Anglican Cycle of Prayer, pray for the Diocese of Chhattisgarh (North India). In our national church, pray for the Diocese of North Queensland; and within our own Diocese, for the Parish of Fullarton.

For our local community. For the Collective and its ministry in the local community. For the Magdalene Centre, as it deals with the need to change the way it delivers services in order to safeguard the health of customers, staff and volunteers.

For those in need. For all those who are sick in body, mind or spirit. For all those affected by the COVID-19 coronavirus and all who care for them. For those who are commended to our prayers, especially Paull, Valerie, Sym, Dulcie, Jasmin, Henry, Fr Gary Priest, Fr Bart O'Donovan, Beth, Linda, and Fr Peter Garland.

For those who have died. For those who have worked and worshipped in this place before us; all those who have died recently, including Graham Pater, those who have died as a result of COVID-19; and those whose anniversaries of death occur at about this time. ★ Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord, and let light perpetual shine upon them.

For the saints. For the Blessed Virgin Mary, St Joseph, St Mary Magdalene, St Barnabas, St Alban, and holy women and men of every time and place.
